.01 Purpose.

The purpose of this directive is to establish academic education policy and procedures for incarcerated individuals within the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (Department).

OPS.195.0003 - Incarcerated Individual Visits

A managing official may issue a facility directive

necessary to implement and comply with this directive.

Variance:

.02 Scope.

This directive applies to all units of the Department responsible for the custody of an incarcerated individual under the authority of the Department and all Maryland Department of Labor (MDL) Correctional Education staff.

.03 Policy.

A. It is the policy of the Department to provide access to academic education programs and related education services through MDL or authorized educational organization to incarcerated individuals who:

- (1) Have 18 months or more to serve when received by the Department and who do not have a verified high school diploma or GED;
- (2) Are mandatory education program students who do not have a verified high school diploma or GED, with or without an Individualized Education Plan; or
- (3) Are non-mandatory education program students who do not have a verified high school diploma or GED.
- B. All education programs provided to incarcerated individuals shall be approved, licensed, or recognized by MDL and the Department or its authorized community provider.
- C. Education programs through the high school equivalency levels are available to incarcerated individuals at no cost regardless of the educational organization.
- D. Academic and related programs are integrated with occupational programs on a case-by-case basis, such as with Integrated Education and Training Programs.

.04 Definitions.

- A. In this directive, the following terms have the meanings indicated.
- B. Terms Defined.
 - (1) Academic Program.
 - (a) "Academic program" means an instructional course provided by MDL.
 - (b) "Academic program" includes:
 - (i) Adult basic education; or
 - (ii) General educational development.
 - (2) "Adult basic education" means a program that provides instruction in basic academic skills to incarcerated individuals.
 - (3) "Correctional Education Council" is a legislatively mandated body that is overseen by MDL and the Department.
 - (4) "Correctional facility" has the meaning stated in Correctional Services Article, §1-101, Annotated Code of Maryland: 'Correctional facility' means a facility that is operated for the purpose of detaining or confining adults who are charged with or found guilty of a crime.
 - (5) "Educational organization" means an academic institution providing educational training and instruction services to incarcerated individuals, to include but not limited to:
 - (a) Maryland Department of Labor;

- (b) Baltimore City Public School System;
- (c) Similar educational institution.
- (6) "General educational development" means a series of academic subjects a student must master in order to earn a high school equivalency diploma.
- (7) Incarcerated Individual.
 - (a) "Incarcerated individual" has the meaning stated in Correctional Services Article, §1-101, Annotated Code of Maryland which states, "Incarcerated individual' means an individual who is actually or constructively detained or confined in a correctional facility."
 - (b) "Incarcerated individual" includes the term "inmate" as stated prior to October 1, 2023 Correctional Services Article, §1-101, Annotated Code of Maryland.
 - (c) "Incarcerated individual" includes the term incarcerated person.
- (8) "Mandatory education" means an education program established under Labor and Employment Article §11-902 and corresponding regulations.
- (9) "Managing official" has the meaning stated in the Correctional Services Article, §1-101, Annotated Code of Maryland: 'Managing official means the administrator, director, warden, superintendent, sheriff, or other individual responsible for the management of a correctional facility.

.05 Responsibilities.

- A. The Director of Education shall ensure that a comprehensive education program and related services are available to eligible incarcerated individuals and are consistent with statutory regulations and the needs of the population.
- B. The Director of Education, in coordination with the correctional education organization shall ensure that:
 - (1) A comprehensive competency-based education program for adult basic education and general educational development (GED) is developed and implemented throughout the Department;
 - (2) Correctional facility demographics, space availability, sentence structures, and the needs of the population are considered when implementing academic and related programs;
 - (3) All adult basic education and GED instruction is based upon a curriculum approved by the Correctional Education Council (CEC);
 - (4) Eligible incarcerated individuals have access to mandated educational opportunities pursuant to <u>Individuals with Disabilities and Education Act (IDEA)</u>, <u>COMAR 09.37.02</u>, and <u>OPS.135.0003</u> – Special Education;

- (5) All teachers are K-12 certified through Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE), or in the case of contracted staff, meet the standards of the educational organization; and
- (6) Academic and related training programs are assessed against related policies, procedures, and mandated requirements at least every three years by a qualified educational specialist.
- C. Individual teachers employed by MDL report to and are supervised by MDL's correctional education principals.
- D. The correctional education profession, business, industry, and community resources are utilized in the development and operation of educational programs as evidenced by MSDE monitoring visits, employer and advisory groups, mock job fairs, and mentoring programs.
- E. MDL Academic Coordinator (AC) shall:
 - (1) Develop, implement, and assess academic and related programs;
 - (2) Provide technical and instructional assistance to individual correctional education teachers and principals;
 - (3) Collect educational data to establish priorities for the efficient management and assessment of academic and related programs;
 - (4) In coordination with the correctional education principal:
 - (a) Coordinate assessments with each correctional facility Correctional Education School Improvement Plan; and
 - (b) Submit an annual assessment of the academic program and services to MDL's Director of Education.
 - (5) Report to and are supervised by MDL's Director of Correctional Education.
- F. MDL Special Education Coordinator (SEC).
 - (1) Special placements including a modified curriculum shall be available for incarcerated individuals who have documented physical, mental, emotional or learning disabilities.
 - (2) The SEC, in coordination with the AC, and MSDE, shall:
 - (a) Provide correctional education teachers and principals support with the implementation and assessment of incarcerated individuals with disabilities who qualify as special education students; and
 - (b) Adhere to provisions of <u>OPS.135.0003 Special Education Services</u> and MDL Labor Correctional Education Program Guide (Appendix B).
 - (3) The correctional education principal or designee shall:
 - (1) Oversee the correctional education operation and instructional leadership of an academic program at the correctional facility, to include, but not be limited to;
 - (a) Developing a course schedule for students enrolled in an academic program;

- (b) Purchasing educational supplies with the approval of the managing official or designee;
- (c) Providing counseling regarding course content and course requirements;
- (d) Analyzing and managing the impact of data on the instructional program and student outcomes; and
- (e) Making arrangements for graduation exercises in consultation with the managing official or designee;
- (2) Assist the AC with the coordination of educational assessments in conjunction with the Correctional Education School Improvement Plan; and
- (3) Coordinate with the managing official or designee to ensure the operation and management of correctional education complies with the safety and security of the facility.

H. The correctional education teacher shall:

- (1) Provide instruction to incarcerated individuals placed into their class;
- (2) Analyze and manage the impact of data on the instructional program and student outcomes;
- (3) Regularly engage in professional learning to enhance classroom instruction; and
- (4) Test incarcerated individuals on the Test for Adult Basic Education (TABE) test for placement and advancement.
- I. The managing official or designee shall:
 - (1) Designate a location for educational organization staff to provide academic services;
 - (2) Coordinate with the correctional education principal and education organization staff such as the AC to ensure the fidelity of the academic program; and
 - (3) Ensure students have access to the library in accordance with <u>OPS.135.0002 Incarcerated</u> Individual Library Services.
- J. Case management specialists shall place mandatory incarcerated individuals into correctional education programs and manage the assignment and removal of students from academic programs in accordance with provisions outlined in <u>DOCM.100.0002 Case Management Manual</u>.

.06 Procedures.

- A. Notice of Education Services and Verification.
 - (1) During the orientation process, correctional staff shall ensure that incarcerated individuals receive information regarding access to correctional education services.
 - (2) The correctional education principal shall:
 - (a) Ensure all incarcerated individuals complete an *Education Verification form Appendix A* to determine if

the incarcerated individual has a high school diploma or GED;

- (b) Verify an incarcerated individual's high school diploma or GED by submitting the Education Verification form to the:
 - (i) Incarcerated individual's high school; or
 - (ii) GED office; and
- (c) Forward the signed Education Verification form to case management.
- (3) Case management shall file the *Education Verification form* in the incarcerated individual's base file.
- B. Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE) Assessment.
 - (1) Incarcerated individuals who are eligible for the mandatory education program must be tested with TABE for placement into academic education programs within 30 days of incarceration.
 - (2) Incarcerated individuals without a high school diploma or verified GED are required to take the TABE test for placement into academic education programs.
 - (3) Certified test facilitators shall administer the TABE to incarcerated individuals for placement into the academic education program.
 - (4) Correctional education teachers shall administer the TABE to incarcerated individuals for advancement to the next academic level.
 - (5) If previously incarcerated individuals return to the custody of the Department, education staff will not retest them if their educational test data is available and no more than one-year-old.
- C. Testing Accommodations. Reasonable accommodations shall be provided for educational testing and instruction based on <u>DPSCS.200.0007- Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Title II Non-discrimination and Accommodations for Persons with Disabilities</u>, and state and federal guidelines.
- D. Academic Enrollment.
 - (1) Students are:
 - (a) Selected for mandatory education programs by case management. If there is no availability, the student shall be placed on the waitlist and receive priority placement when an academic course has an opening;
 - (b) Selected for voluntary education programs by MDL. If there is no availability, the student shall be placed on the waitlist; and
 - (c) Assigned on an open entry, open exit basis to allow maximum utilization of resources.

- (2) Academic Waitlist for Mandatory Education.
 - (a) Case management shall forward the waitlist of incarcerated individuals who are eligible for mandatory education to the principal.
 - (b) The correctional education principal shall:
 - (i) Review the waitlist and enroll incarcerated individuals in academic programs as determined by classroom vacancies; and
 - (ii) Forward the list of enrolled students to case management to place the student in the education student job assignment.
- (3) Academic Waitlist for Non-Mandatory Education.
 - (a) An incarcerated individual shall submit a written request to the principal to enroll in an academic program as a non-mandatory student.
 - (b) The correctional education principal shall review non-mandatory enrollment requests.
 - (c) If determined that there is a vacancy in the academic program, the correctional education principal shall:
 - (i) In consultation with case management, enroll eligible the incarcerated individual into the academic program; and
 - (ii) Forward the approved enrollment list to case management for processing and placement of the incarcerated individual into the education student job assignment.
 - (d) If determined that there is not a vacancy in the academic program, the correctional education principal shall:
 - (i) Place the incarcerated individual on the non-mandatory education waitlist;
 - (ii) Once there is a vacancy, enroll the incarcerated individual in the academic program;
 - (iii) Forward the enrollment list to case management for processing and placement of the individual in the education student job assignment.
- (4) The correctional education principal may move students from one academic classroom to another to best accommodate student and class needs and to assist in filling vacancies.
- (5) Special education services shall be processed in accordance with *OPS.135.0003 Special Education Services*.
- (6) Students who are enrolled and participating in an academic program shall receive authorized daily stipends, monthly diminution of confinement credits, and additional diminution of

- confinement credits for completion of ABE level 4 and GED test.
- (7) Incarcerated individuals assigned to a work assignment cannot be a volunteer i.e., student aid or tutor in an educational program.
- (8) An incarcerated individual's primary assignment must be as an education student to receive diminution credits.
- (9) Professional interpreters or translation services, such as sign language, are available to incarcerated individuals participating in academic programs in accordance with DPSCS.200.0007-ADA for Incarcerated Individuals and Delicy.

E. Attendance.

- (1) Incarcerated individuals who are enrolled in the mandatory education program are required to attend school for a minimum of 240 consecutive days, unless exempted for medical or developmental reasons.
- (2) Incarcerated individuals shall attend all classes to which they are assigned.
- (3) Students who are absent more than 3 days per month will be considered for removal by the correctional education principal and case management.
- F. Depending on facility schedules, student needs, and staff availability, some academic classes may be offered in the evening hours to accommodate incarcerated individuals who have treatment or work obligations during the day.
- G. Removal from the Academic Program.
 - (1) A student may be removed from the educational program by case management action as outlined in *DOCM*. 100.0002 Case Management Manual.
 - (2) Reassignments for academic programming must be processed through a case management specialist.
- H. Family members and visitors shall be encouraged to attend graduation ceremonies and shall be screened and approved in accordance with *OPS.195.0003 Incarcerated Individual Visits*.
- I. Educational Records.
 - (1) Case management shall file and maintain student education records provided by educational staff, to include, but not limited to:
 - (a) Diploma;
 - (b) Certificates; and
 - (c) Grade records.

- (2) Education records shall be maintained in accordance with Department record retention schedule no. 2424-08
- (3) Student records are confidential and shall be stored in a locked, secured location.
- (4) No incarcerated individual shall have access to another incarcerated individual's record.

We value collaborative partnerships and will maintain successful relationships with a network of committed agencies to support the needs of our instructors and transitional programs.


We believe technology can improve our ability to educate our students and we will continue to identify opportunities to integrate this within our curriculum and instructional delivery.

MARYLAND ADULT CORRECTIONAL EDUCATION PROGRAM

Correctional Education provides educational opportunities for incarcerated men and women enabling them to become independent and productive workers, citizens, and parents. The Maryland Department of Labor's (MD Labor) Correctional Education Program under the authority of the Correctional Education Council (CEC), in conjunction with the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS), is responsible for the educational programs provided in Maryland's correctional institutions.





school completion. When an inmate passes the 2019 GED® Test, the state issues a Maryland high school diploma. Special education services are available for eligible under 21 students who possess an Individual Education Plan (IEP). After passing the 2019 GED® Test, students may proceed into one of the 25 occupational programs offered throughout the state. Prior to release, most inmates are able to enroll in transitional or workforce development courses. Library services are also available to complement the educational programs and to encourage independent learning.

Most of the 25 offered occupational training programs include national certification, which prepares them for entry level employment upon release. In the transitional programs, students gain valuable life skills and develop short and long term employment plans, including job search strategies, with the overarching goal of economic self-sufficiency.

In summary, Correctional Education supports the mission of the DPSCS by providing educational, library and employment services for inmates as they prepare for successful re-entry and re-integration into the community, in order to move from prison to middle income.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

The Maryland Correctional Education Academic Program offers a full learning continuum for students. Instruction is provided to inmates from the beginning levels of instruction in mathematics, reading, and writing to high school completion. Classes are organized into five different instructional levels based on student skill levels. The following are descriptions of the individual courses skill level requirements and curriculum.

Beginning Literacy

Students who have no, or very minimal skills begin at this level. Their skills are developed to the equivalent of a second-grade student. Class instruction includes learning the skills of new readers and very basic math skills of addition and subtraction. Writing is at the sentence level.

Offered at BCCC, CMCF, DRCF, ECI-A, ECI-E, ECI-W, ICI, MCI-H, MCI-I, MCI-W, MCTC, MTC, NBCI, PATX, RCI, and WCI

Beginning Basic

Students who have developed beginning level skills continue to develop reading, math, and writing skills. At this level, students are able to do addition, subtraction, multiplication, and easy division. Phonics and decoding skills are learned in reading. Writing focuses on writing multiple sentences about the same topic. Their skill level is equivalent to second and third grade level skills.

Offered at BCCC, CMCF, DRCF, ECI-A, ECI-E, ECI-W, JCI, MCI-H, MCI-J, MCI-W, MCTC, MTC, NBCI, PATX, RCI, and WCI

Intermediate Low

Students at this level are learning the skills equivalent to grades four and five. Skills and knowledge developed allow students to read a variety of materials, such as newspapers. Writing a paragraph is learned. Math skills include fractions and the beginning of decimals.

Offered at BCCC, CMCF, DRCF, ECI-A, ECI-E, ECI-W, JCI, MCI-H, MCI-J, MCI-W, MCTC, MTC, NBCI, PATX, RCI, and WCI

Intermediate High

Students at this level are learning the skills of the equivalent to grades six through eight. Skills continue to be developed and the knowledge and skills allow the student to read, compute, and write efficient enough to enter a high school level curriculum. Writing a simple essay is learned. Reading skills build on critical reading and comprehension skills. Math refines decimals and begins geometry. Students at this level are also beginning to prepare for the 2019 GED® Test. Social Studies and Science are introduced as a skill area emphasis. Writing a specialized essay to persuade or prove a point is learned. Students are introduced to algebra, higherlevel geometry, and basic probability.

Offered at BCCC, CMCF, DRCF, ECI-A, ECI-E, ECI-W, JCI, MCI-H, MCI-J, MCI-W, MCTC, MTC, NBCI, PATX, RCI, and WCI

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

General Educational Development (GED)

Students at this level are preparing to take the 2019 GED® Test. Skills are being refined and the knowledge and skills of ninth to twelfth grade are included at this level. The content areas of Social Studies and Science are refined. Reading in the content areas is the set of skills refined. Writing a research paper is learned. Higher-level mathematics is taught including statistics and probability, integers, exponents, and algebra that is more advanced. The content is designed to meet the state standards for graduation.

Offered at BCCC, CMCF, DRCF, ECI-A, ECI-E, ECI-W, JCI, MCI-H, MCI-J, MCI-W, MCTC, MTC, NBCI, PATX, RCI, and WCI

English as a Second Language (ESL) —

Instruction is provided for those whose native language is not English. ESL classes help students develop speaking, listening, reading, writing, and grammar skills necessary to communicate English effectively within their workplaces, communities, and families.

Offered at MCI-H, MCI-J, and MCI-W, and MCTC



SPECIAL EDUCATION PROGRAM

The Adult Correctional Special Education Program operates within the parameters of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA 2004), Code of Maryland Annotated Regulations (COMAR) 13A.05.01 and No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. The purpose of the federal mandates is to provide Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) services to all students with disabilities through the age of 21 who are incarcerated within the Maryland Correctional System. The seamless delivery of services is provided regardless of the inmate's disability. The program has written policies and procedures to guide special education programs and services. All educational program options are subject to the Department of Correction security restrictions and institutions operating procedures. Special Education services are offered at eleven (11) Adult Correctional Institutions and the Baltimore City Detention Center.

Fundamental to the Adult Correctional Special Education Program is the continued commitment to provide appropriate services. Students with disabilities are placed in the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) and provided an equal opportunity for participation in academic interests. These educational services are delivered year-round. To every extent possible, a continuum of alternative placement is offered to meet the needs of students with disabilities for special education and related services. The continuum of alternative placement includes instruction in regular classes (Literacy Lab, Adult Basic Education and Adult Secondary Education) and identified vocational programs (i.e. Employment Readiness Workshop). To this extent, students are placed in an inclusive learning environment. To address the specific needs of incarcerated individuals who are in need of Special Education services, Individual Education Plan (IEP) meetings are held to determine the appropriateness of placement, continued placement, and supplementary services.

For program sustainability, the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) awards the Local Application for Federal Funds (LAFF), a state pass-through grant to provide assistance for the program's overall operation. Operational funds include resources for related service providers, teacher professional development, and other budget line items to operate the program effectively. The discretionary grant from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) provided funds to hire a statewide Transition Specialist, to offer students and staff strategies, techniques and materials for career development, and employability skill development.

Special Education Re-Entry Initiatives include the participation of staff to complete certification for the Offender Employment Specialist Training (OES), the infusion of transition skills into daily lesson plans, and the completion of career assessments for each identified student in Special Education.

CAREER AND TECHNOLOGY PROGRAMS

Correctional Education offers 25 CTE programs in 10 correctional facilities taught by 45 instructors. Courses run from 200 hours (2 months) to 600 hours (6 months) in length with the exception of the Barber Stylist Program, which is a 900-hour program. All CTE courses require a high school diploma for enrollment, and it is highly recommended that students be within 36 months of release.

Architectural CADD

Students are introduced to Computer-Aided Drafting and Design techniques as they apply to architectural design, floor plans, exterior and interior layouts, 3D modeling and visualization. Students prepare a portfolio of their work for potential employers.

Graduates are awarded a MD Labor state certification. ASE Entry Level technician national certification is also offered.

Course Length: 600 hours

Offered at ECI-W

Automotive Collision Repair and Restoration

Students learn proper use of hand and power tools and are introduced to the fundamental of auto body repair including welding, surface preparation, composite repairs, and spray painting.

Graduates are awarded a MD Labor state certification. ASE Entry Level technician national certification is also offered.

Course Length: 600 hours

Offered at MCTC

Automotive Maintenance and Inspection

Students focus on automotive maintenance and inspection with work on fluids, filters, belts, hoses, suspensions, tires, brakes, and battery. **Graduates are awarded MD Labor state certification.**

Course Length: 600 hours

Offered at ECI-W, MCI-I, MCTC, OSTC, RCI

Barber Stylist * New for FY19

Students learn entry-level barbering skills, which includes classroom instruction, practical application, and clinical practice in most areas of, barber training. The program will prepare individuals to become licensed as Limited Licensed Barbers upon completion.

CAREER AND TECHNOLOGY PROGRAMS

Certified Peer Recovery Specialist

Students have the opportunity to become credentialed as a CPRS, which is accredited by the Maryland Addiction and Behavioral-health Professional Certification Board. Students will learn skills through their training to help not only themselves as they work to sustain their own personal recovery from addiction, but they will also be trained to support other incarcerated women through their recovery journey.

Diesel Technology -

TRANSITIONAL PROGRAMS

Employment Readiness Workshop

Students gain skills for employment in preparation for community re-entry. Students prepare for entering the workforce by completing career assessments, developing career plans, using tools for job searches, such as resumes, applications, identification cards, and comprehensive job search plans. Students utilize assessment tools, current labor market information, and community resource information to develop realistic short and long-term employment plans as they prepare to re-enter the community.

Graduates are awarded MD Labor state certification.

Course Length: 20-40 hours

Offered at CMCF, DRCF, ECI-E, ECI-W, MCI-H, MCI-I, MCI-W, MCTC, OSTC, RCI, and WCI

Personal Assessment and Career Exploration (PACE)

Students complete comprehensive personal and career interest assessments. Students use the results of these assessments to engage in detailed career exploration and complete research on their two most desirable careers. Up-to-date labor market information is available for use throughout the course. Students also develop a plan for an effective job search. By the end of the course, students will have completed a re-entry plan that addresses housing, treatment, family reunification, education/training, and employment.

Graduates are awarded MD Labor state certification.

Course Length: 80 hours
Offered at MCI-W and MCTC

Introduction to Computers

Students in this course learn the most important topics in computer concepts. Course subjects include basic keyboarding, Word, Excel, PowerPoint. Students learn different software applications and their uses including documents, spreadsheets, and PowerPoint presentations. Students also learn about the basic hardware components and troubleshooting.

Graduates are awarded MD Labor state certification.

Course Length: 40-80 hours

Basic Keyboarding

This course assists students in developing the skills necessary to use a computer keyboard with precession, accuracy, and speed. Students learn to use the alphabetic and numeric keypads along with other function keys. Periodic assessment tests and practice exercises encourage proper utilization of a computer keyboard. This is a basic skill that must be mastered for further training on computer skills.

Financial Literacy

Students learn strategies to manage their finances post-release. Students create budgets, learn about personal banking, long term financial planning, personal savings, investing, the importance of credit health and understanding the importance of earning a living wage. Students also identify short-term and long-term financial goals. This course is taught both as a stand-alone course and as a unit of both Employment Readiness Workshop and Life Skills.

Parenting for Success

Students in this course complete two modules including parenting during incarceration and updating your parenting skills. Through multi-media resources and special presentations, students learn how to plan inexpensive activities with children, discuss incarceration with children, stay involved in the lives of children and family, and update information about child development.

Life Skills for Re-Entry

Students learn the steps of goal setting, decision making, and developing a personal action plan. Modules of instruction include, but are not limited to, healthy relationships, successful parenting strategies, managing stress and women's health topics, financial literacy, employability skills, and effective approaches to the job search strategies.

Graduates are awarded MD Labor state certification.

Course Length: 40-80 hours

Health and Nutrition

Students learn strategies to better manage health care issues for themselves and their families, and complete daily assignments/special projects to address health and nutrition both inside outside of prison.

Success at Work

Success at Work focuses on the development and review of the skills necessary to retain a job once hired. The applied skills that are taught in this course include basic work habits and behaviors, work attitude and values, communication and interpersonal skills, problem solving, teamwork, employer expectations, and professionalism on the job. The course is very interactive in nature and uses scenarios derived from institutional work assignments and from private sector employment situations.

Graduates are awarded MD Labor state certification.

Reentry and Employment Resources

DPSCS and MD LABOR have collaborated to provide limited internet access to inmates who are planning for release and post release employment. In total, inmates at 21 facilities have access to at least one computer with secure internet access that allows them to search two (2) websites including the Maryland Workforce Exchange, and America's Job Exchange. Correctional Education coordinates and assists in thirteen (13) facilities to operate this program on a regular basis. Inmates with 120 days or less remaining in their sentence receive priority in the use of these computers. On average, CE staff assists approximately 300 inmates per month to learn to navigate and utilize these important websites as they prepare for successful reentry into the community.

Workshop Participation -

Inmates have the opportunity to learn about additional programming through our workshop series. Guest speakers provide information on topics such as entrepreneurship, expungement, training and apprenticeship opportunities that are available upon release. The series reinforces communication and interpersonal skills.

Graduates are awarded MD Labor state certification.

Course length: 8 hours

LIBRARY PROGRAMS

Correctional Education Libraries provide services that meet the information, recreational, lifelong learning, and transitional needs of inmates, preparing them to be successful ex-offenders.

The libraries provide legal reference service, legal and general databases, listening stations, and general reading materials on a variety of high interest and educational topics to all the inmates.

Librarians provide a variety of programs primarily through general book discussions and programs on reentry. Some librarians collaborate with institutional personnel to broaden the scope of programs. Programs include Mavis Beacon typing classes, introduction to legal resources, Programs for and with Incarcerated Veterans (IVOR), Limited Internet Job Searching (MWE), career videos, and art exhibitions. Additionally, outside guests are invited to speak on a variety of topics, including licensing and apprenticeship.

Library Access - The library is open to all inmates in the Maryland Correctional system. For inmates who have no physical access to the library, librarians use the institutional mail or clerk delivery system to provide services. Where institutions allow, librarians or library clerks make weekly visits to the segregated units. Maryland inmates who are housed out-of-state receive legal responses through the mail.
